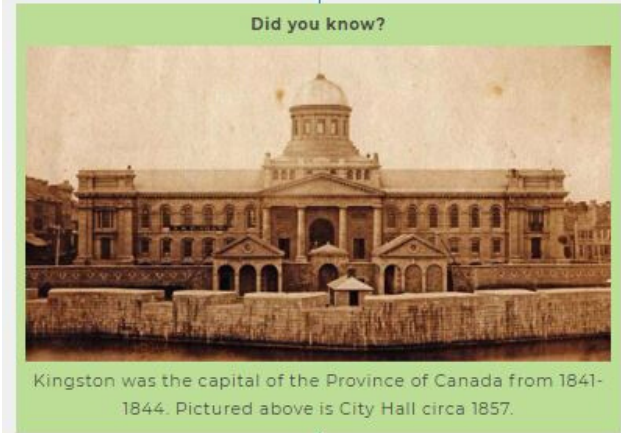

PUMPHOUSE STORY SCAVENGER HUNT ANSWER KEY



1842- Keeping the Capital
While the government was discussing the removal of The Capital from Kingston, the town decided it would need water works in order to maintain its status as the Capital. The Town was indebted to its new town hall they could not afford to build a water system themselves; private investors undertook the project instead.

FIRE!
The Great Fire flagged many of the problems with Kingston's emergency mechanisms. Fires were put out by groups of volunteers, often divided. The religious climate of Kingston at this time often meant volunteers would spend valuable time fighting with each other as opposed to putting out the fires. In addition to this, buildings were insured by both parties. If Catholics showed up at a fire and found out it was insured by the Protestants, they would leave the building to burn.

November 1844
The capital of Canada was moved to Montreal.

May 18th 1846
Kingston was incorporated as a city which gave it the right to erect, preserve and regulate cisterns, reservoirs, or other conveniences for good wholesome water. This
